The Camp Springs community came together for our First Annual Shred Day on November 2, 2013. This event was heavily attended by Camp Springs residents as well as our neighboring communities. The event started at 10 am with

residents already in line. There were volunteers from the Camp Springs Civic Association, Crossland High School, Thurgood Marshall Middle School, and Her Story Mentoring program. The volunteers assisted residents with unloading bags and boxes of shred materials. The materials were then taken to the onsite shred truck where residents were able to witness their items being shredded. Various community partners assisted in making the day a success. CenterPoint Church graciously allowed us to host the event at their location; All Thingz Creative provided a beautiful banner and fliers detailing the event and Infuse Restaurant provided a generous lunch for all of the volunteers. MGM Selected to Build Casino at National Harbor

The Maryland Video Lottery Facility Location Commission voted 5 to 2 to award Maryland's sixth and final casino license to MGM Resorts International to develop a multi- million dollar casino complex at National Harbor in Prince George's County.

MGM waged a long and costly campaign at the tune of about \$40 million to win the chance to build a \$925 million casino near the Potomac River.

New Minimum Wage

Prince George's County Council voted on November 27, 2013 to raise the minimum wage for workers in the county to \$11.50 per hour by 2017. Wages will increase more than a dollar a year over the next four years. The current minimum wage of \$7.25 per hour (about \$15,000 per year) has not changed since 2009.

Change in Leadership

The Prince George's County Council starts the New Year with a new Chair and Vice Chair. Council Member Mel Franklin (District 9) was elected Chair and Council Member Will Campos (District 2) vice chair on December 3, 2013. They replace outgoing members Andrea Harrison (District 5) as former Chair and District 8's Council Member Obie Patterson as Vice Chair.

Going Green

Prince George's County has a program to help communities "turn

green" with trees. The ReLeaf Grant Program provides landscape funding to community organizations and municipalities for planting projects in public spaces. For more information, go to the Department of Environmental Resources website: http://www.princegeorgescountym d.gov

Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions

During a snow emergency, parking is prohibited along all designated snow emergency routes. It is permitted only in driveways or on the evennumbered side of the street. Failure to comply with designated snow emergency routes can result in a fine up to \$50 and/or towing.

Also note that you must remove snow and ice from sidewalks along your property within 48 hours after precipitation has stopped. Failure to clear snow and ice from sidewalks can result in a \$100 fine.

Hold up: don't put those leaves in plastic bags

Effective January 1, 2014, residential curbside yard waste collection will no longer be accepted in plastic bags. The Department of Environmental Resources has banned plastic bags for yard waste collection and advises residents to use trash cans or large yard waste paper bags (Note: 5 yard waste paper bags can be bought at home improvement stores for less than \$2.00).

 Here are source reduction tips from DER: use a mulching mower to finely shred your

- mowed grass and leave it on the lawn. Start a backyard compost pile.
- Mark your calendar for the next community-wide Clean-Up Green-Up scheduled for April 26, 2014.

New Bus Service

Southern Prince George's County has a new bus route that extends from the Clinton Fringe Park & Ride to the MD-5/US-301 corridor to Brandywine Crossing Shopping Center. The bus then connects with Charles County's bus service at the Pinefield Shopping Center. The bus is Route 36.
